What makes you feel good? Does anything right now? With all the horrors in our world, the climate challenges of excess drought, floods, fires which are out of control, hurricanes, earthquakes and volcanoes, it is easy to be depressed, worried and fearful. What will happen in the future, you might be asking. Can the trend toward a ruined planet be reversed and if so, how? Then the crisis in Haiti and in Afghanistan might be worrying you greatly. Rather than worry and feel helpless, you might ask—how can I help? If that is the case, you can respond to the message Dave S. sent asking for Messiah members to help an Afghanistan family who are looking for help as they move from their current location to a home in New Jersey. Maybe you could help prepare the home for them or take them to a store on one occasion. Volunteers are needed for even the simplest of jobs. If you have the time and also the skills maybe you could tutor once or twice a week. There are opportunities for everyone whether it is for one time or on a regular basis. Thus, I return to the opening question “what makes you feel good?” and suggest being able to help someone in need might be an answer.

Or maybe you are thinking of a different answer to the question of what makes you feel good. Do you reply by saying that doing nice things, being with people you love, eating your favorite foods, having a drink (note the singular!) with friends, or going to a show, going out for a meal are things that make you feel good? All these possibilities are about how you can cater to your own needs, how you can love yourself.

This is important as you know Jesus said that you are to love your neighbor as yourself. Thus, you need to know how to love yourself so that you can use the same ideas to love your neighbor. Look again at the list. Are you making sure that neighbors, others, wherever they live, have the same opportunities? Can you think of someone who does not, whom you could help?

In your prayers, could you talk to God about how you can love your neighbor or reach out to someone in need despite this time of Covid? Maybe because we are in Covid times you know the person would welcome your friendship. Does praying to God also make you feel good? The weekly announcements include all those for whom Messiah members have been asked to pray. Does it feel good to pray for them? When people have prayed for me, I have become aware of it and feel so blessed to have their prayers. I feel good knowing people are praying for me. Please know that I use our directory (I add all the new members) each day to pray for you all. It connects me with you all and that makes me feel good.

So today and this month, despite the challenges of life, think about your happiness and what God has given you to make you happy and then think how you can help others. Could this be your October ministry?

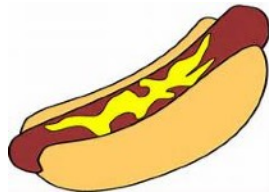

## Inquirer's & Confirmation Classes

There could be a Confirmation class for students 8<sup>th</sup> grade and older. Students who attend can be Confirmed next year if they so choose. Parents of students in this age group are encouraged to speak with Margaret for details about the class. There could be teenagers from District churches joining our group. An adult Inquirer's class is offered either on a Sunday after worship or during the week. Please talk to Margaret if you are interested in attending. A class usually lasts for 5 sessions.



The class is for those unfamiliar with the teachings of the Church in general and/or the Episcopal Church in particular. During the class, we allow time for discussion of any questions you may have. A booklet is provided with reading assignments.

After completing the class, you may choose to be confirmed by the Bishop at a local church or at the diocesan cathedral. If you were *Confirmed* in another tradition, you can be *Received* by the Bishop at this service.

If you feel you would like to renew your Confirmation vows, you can choose to do that at the service. The Bishop will lay hands upon you and pray for you, similar to the way she welcomes and prays for Confirmands.

## Where is the Church Headed? Trytank.org Wants Your Input

Trytank Experimental Laboratory, a joint project initiated by Virginia Theological Seminary and The General Theological Seminary, is exploring innovative solutions to the challenges facing the Episcopal Church. They would like your insights and ideas.

This past month, the church's Agrarian Ministries' Creation Care program hosted an event which included guest speaker Reverend Lorenzo Lebrija. Reverend Lebrija is a dynamic speaker whose goal is to develop and implement congregational outreach experiments so that the next generations can be touched by God's presence. His emphasis is on meeting people not at the church or inside the church, but out in the community-making personal connections so that when someone needs assistance or help, they remember their encounter. The Good News Garden Program which was developed as a national Episcopal initiative under the Agrarian Ministries Creation Care program is an example.

According to Reverend Lebrija, the reality is that current members attend church an average of only once every 4-6 weeks. His Creation Care presentation video which speaks to this issue, will be available soon and shared with our members. A forum type discussion will be scheduled for interested members. ## RAMP is getting ready!

More than 9,000 Afghan refugees are now at Ft. Dix, being processed over the next few months. When they are cleared to leave, many will remain in New Jersey. Refugee Assistance Morris Partners (RAMP) is in weekly contact with the International Rescue Committee, Church World Service and other agencies about the current status. In the meantime, we are getting prepared to welcome families to a safe and secure life in Morris County. **We are looking for suitable and affordable housing and seeking and training volunteers.** We need people who are drivers, teachers, people who can help set up medical appointments and shop for food. We continue to receive many generous financial donations. At this time, we are *not* seeking donations of clothing, household goods, toys, etc. The time may come when we reach out for items like that, but not yet.

What RAMP *does* need right now are **organizations willing to sponsor families**, with RAMP support. If you would be interested in helping Church of The Messiah be a sponsor (or a co-sponsor), or you are involved with another organization that could possibly be a sponsor, and would like to know more about what this involves, please let me know or email RAMP directly at [info@rampnj.org](mailto:info@rampnj.org). We are also looking to **beef up our executive team** by adding people experienced in non-profit management, marketing, social media communications, and finance.

Since 2016, RAMP has successfully supported six families – more than 20 people – as they transition to lives of security and success in the United States. They have secure jobs, the children are getting good educations, and they know that RAMP members love them and have become good friends. With your continuing help, we can continue to make a difference.

The Office of Government Affairs of The Episcopal Church represents us on critical public policy issues, advocating for positions taken by our bishops. It is easy to learn what those positions are on the website of our church: [www.episcopalchurch.org](http://www.episcopalchurch.org). Click on Ministries, then on Office of Government Affairs.

There you will find a list of Action Alerts that spell out the church's position on such matters as the Cuban embargo, the Arctic Refuge Protection Act, gun reform, immigration reform, voting reform and police reform. It is easy to add your voice on these issues on the website. You can find a letter on each issue, add your own thoughts, and immediately email it to your representatives in Washington. You can also sign up to receive email alerts from the Office of Government Affairs.

## Vestry Remarks – Social Justice

Good morning. I want to tell you about the social justice team at Messiah. As Christians, all of us have already promised to work on social justice. Remember your baptismal covenant? We were asked “Will you strive for justice and peace among all people and respect the dignity of every human being?” We all answered, “I will, with God’s help.”

If we are to make a difference, we need to do more than just respect the dignity of others, we need to take actions to ensure that all people receive the dignity God has promised.

Here are some of the things our social justice team has worked on: helping refugees from Syria and Afghanistan, with more of the Afghans on the way right now; we have rallied against gun violence, held vigils at the Chester Gazebo to call for an end to Asian-American violence and delivered letters of support to local Asian-American businesses. We have learned about and honored the Native

Americans, the original occupants of this very land where we are right now. We have worked on issues like food insecurity and climate change. We have been active in the Diversity Coalition of Morris County and New Jersey Together. We have learned how to advocate for public policy issues with our legislators.

We meet together monthly on a Zoom call. The next one will be Monday, Oct. 4<sup>th</sup> from 7:00-8:00 p.m. You are welcome to join us. If you have an issue or a cause you are passionate about, we will help. We are a group of 10 good friends doing good deeds, having good fellowship, and maybe causing some good trouble, as John Lewis called it.

Dr. Martin Luther King famously said, and Barack Obama repeated it, “The arc of the moral universe is long, but it bends toward justice.” Come help us bend it a little. Thank you.

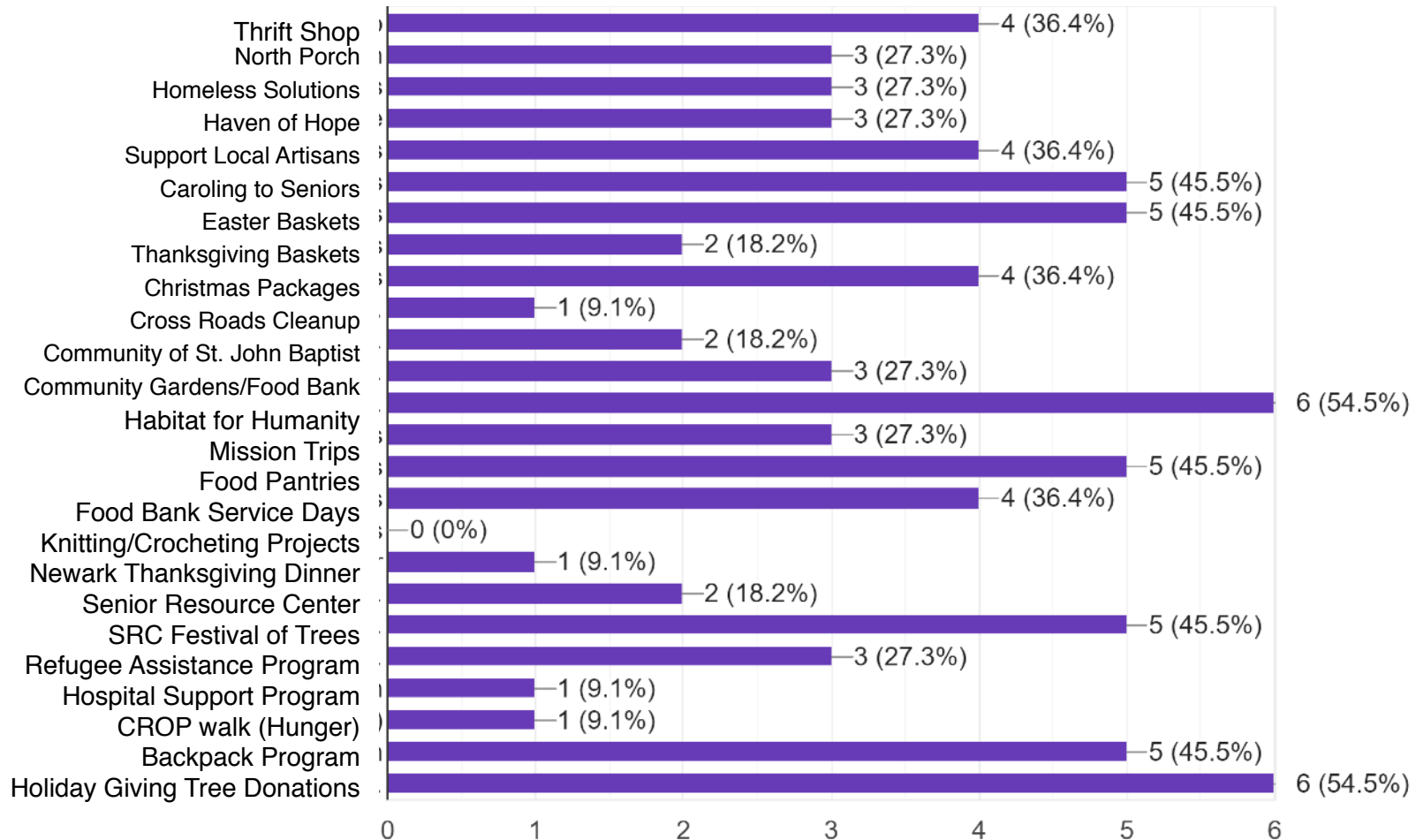
