The Epistle reading for January 16 is about gifts of the Spirit. The Apostle Paul tells the people of Corinth (1 Corinthians 12) how to use their gifts for the common good and to use them together. It seems a great message for us, here at Messiah at this time. Since I will be retiring, you will all need to use your gifts to work together as you discern a new clergy person and spiritual leader and I need to use my gifts to graciously move aside as we spend these next five months together. I feel sure God will be with you throughout this discernment time and a new leader will be called who will match your needs and challenge you in good ways to go forward, sharing Christ's Gospel of love.

I do not know what lies ahead for me as I am sure there will be ministry opportunities where Mike and I will live, somewhere in South Jersey.

Let me share with you: Fifteen years ago, you were looking for a full-time rector; someone who would bring opportunities for active outreach, programs, be a worship leader, be the President of the Senior Resource Center – I have listed some of your wishes. Your willingness to be involved in outreach has been heart-warming. From 2008 onwards (until Covid arrived), each summer a group of us went on a week-long mission trip, living within a community and collaborating with the leaders who had invited us. Also, from 2008 we started regular monthly service at Homeless Solutions, taking the food and cooking and serving it to all who were there. We were able to continue even through Covid, mostly with just two of us being there to do it. Each Christmas we brought gifts for the needy (most years to kids at Transitional Housing) backpacks in the summer for needy kids and baskets/gift bags at Easter for needy families supported by the Chester food pantry. Every Sunday (it used to be monthly) you are encouraged to bring items for the two local

food pantries, and you do. All these ministries listed above are a sample.... programs (you wished to have and I introduced) have included adult education – Sunday forums, Bible studies, Inquirer's classes, EFM groups, lunch time discussion group, summer discussion groups, all taking place weekly (pre-Covid). They happen because you attend them. Sunday school continued of course (with remote packages during Covid). From 2010, we offered week-long vacation Bible camp, involving many adult leaders, because you cared about our kids. We even developed an outside evening program during Covid. In worship, we have offered 8 a.m. and 10 a.m. services every week, because you attend. Covid invited creativity including the opportunity to worship outside which was possible with the skills John P., Dani P., and Laura B. brought to us. The fledging SRC is now a large thriving community offering many programs, and very good opportunities and support for seniors.

Only you all can decide on where your priorities lie and how you wish to go forward, but I hope you will all work together, bring your God-given gifts into use for Messiah and share Christ's Gospel of love together. You have wonderful leaders, but they need your support, the support of every member of Messiah. You all pledged well for this year. You are a thriving community.

I encourage you to keep praying, keep praising, and keep loving one another. I invite you to have as your mantra the closing words from the next (13<sup>th</sup>) chapter from Paul's letter to the Corinthians: *And now faith hope and love abide, these three, but the greatest of these is love.*

## Book 'n Movie Night



Tuesdays, January 31<sup>st</sup> & March 1<sup>st</sup>

## Annual Meeting Sunday, February 13<sup>th</sup>

Our annual meeting will be held here, in the sanctuary, at 11:30 on Sunday, February 13<sup>th</sup>. You are invited to go to the parish hall following the 10 a.m. service for coffee and a snack, and then return to the sanctuary. The annual meeting will start as soon as all have returned.

At this meeting we will elect a new warden, and three vestry members each for a three-year term. We will also elect three Diocesan Convention delegates. The position of treasurer is not covered by the election but we will be appointing a treasurer. We hope our treasurer, John P., will continue to serve; he is also a vestry member. Please talk to the wardens - Merica and Dani - or to Margaret if you wish to be on the vestry or are interested in learning more about this ministry. Please note the vestry meets by Zoom; not in-person, the second Tuesday of each month.

We will celebrate the ministries of those who are retiring from the vestry: Merica G. has served 4 years (2 consecutive terms) as a warden. She has served conscientiously and lovingly. We greatly appreciate all her hard work. As warden she has always been available to me for discussion, advice, and support. This is what a rector needs. Together with our other warden Dani P., the support, advice and friendship from them both has been just wonderful. Jackie M. is retiring after serving 3 years as a vestry member. She has been the liaison for worship and music and has led the worship committee conscientiously and lovingly, especially during nearly 2 years of Covid restrictions. She has an excellent grasp of our liturgy and thus led the liturgy committee really well.

We will also celebrate the ministry of Mike O. who has been a Diocesan Convention delegate for many years. He will be retiring this year. The next Diocesan Convention is in May. Please let Margaret know if you wish to be one of our three delegates. Linda O. who served last year (and went with Mike and Margaret as an in-person delegate) is standing again for election. Hans S. is also willing to stand again.

We will be welcoming a new warden and three people to serve on the vestry for a three year term and one to complete an unexpired two year term (vacated by Debbie B.).

Our new warden will be Debbie B. who is currently serving on the vestry. Debbie is already one of our leaders; she has served on the vestry for the past four years already. She was also on the vestry back in 2007 when I came to Messiah. Debbie, with the support of Debbie B. has been the chair for our buildings and will continue in

that role, again with the support of Chris M. Our vestry is very pleased to welcome Debbie as the new warden, serving with Dani.

Holly P. is a member of both the bell choir (currently active and playing monthly) as well as the vocal choir (currently waiting for Covid restrictions to lift when conditions improve).

Keith H. is a regular worshiper at 8 a.m. and helped on Messiah work days last summer/fall.

Pat K. is a member of the bell choir (currently active and playing monthly) and is active in outreach ministries.

Bernadette R. is taking the unexpired 2 year term vacated by Debbie, who will be warden.

## St Elsie's Thrift Shop Needs Your Help!

These jobs can be done any time at your convenience:

- Load a few boxes into your car for Salvation Army and drop them off in Hackettstown, or Restore in the Randolph area. There are two tables along the far back wall of the basement by the exit to the back-parking lot. There is a sign on the wall indicating "Salvation Army". Anything on that table goes to Salvation Army. We fill that table weekly.
- Bring up the garbage that is next to the exit door by the same table. There is a sign that says "garbage". Bring upstairs to the dumpster in the back parking lot.
- When you enter the drop off room of the thrift shop, there are two shelves on the right-hand side. These are the dropped off donations. Sometimes they are also on the floor. Separate the household items from the clothes. The clothes can be taken to the back table by all the hangers and sorted by tops and bottoms. Keep off-season clothing separate.

## Inquirer's & Confirmation Classes



There could be a Confirmation class for students 8<sup>th</sup> grade and older. Students who attend can be confirmed this year if they so choose. Parents of students in this age group are encouraged to speak with Margaret for details about the class. There could be teenagers from District churches joining our group. An adult Inquirer's class is offered either on a Sunday after worship or during the week. Please talk to Margaret if you are interested in attending. A class usually lasts for 5 sessions.

The class is for those unfamiliar with the teachings of the Church in general

and/or the Episcopal Church in particular. During the class, we allow time for discussion of any questions you may have. A booklet is provided with reading assignments.

After completing the class, you may choose to be confirmed by the Bishop at a local church or at the diocesan cathedral. If you were **Confirmed** in another tradition, you can be **Received** by the Bishop at this service.

If you feel you would like to renew your confirmation vows, you can choose to do that at the service. The Bishop will lay hands upon you and pray for you, similar to the way she welcomes and prays for confirmands.

(for all of us, nothing to do with ordination)



We are reading articles from "The Christian Century" which Margaret provides. Please ask her for copies.




## Bible Study


Margeret and Julie alternate leads for each Messiah team for now as we are aware of the changes in protocol.



## Voting Rights Should Not Be Taken for Granted

The right to vote is fundamental to a healthy democracy, but that right has not always been granted to everyone. Women were only guaranteed the right to vote with the ratification of the 19<sup>th</sup> amendment to the Constitution in 1920. That was during my mother's lifetime. I grew up in the segregated South in the 1940s-60s. African-Americans during that time faced devious, evil obstructions that made voting dangerous, difficult or impossible. Thanks to the Civil Rights movement, the Voting Rights Act of 1965 was passed, prohibiting racial discrimination in voting.

The Episcopal Church's policy, according to the Office of Government Relations, is as follows:

“As we turn to the New Year, we will also plan to reinvigorate our advocacy on voting rights, to increase our voter engagement efforts for another midterm election year and to reflect on the privilege it is to live in a democracy, imperfect as it is. This can be a frightening time to live in our democracy, and indeed in many places around the world where it can seem that authoritarianism is growing. But we can take action. Historically, voting rights, and in particular updates to the Voting Rights Act, have enjoyed widespread and partisan support...We can continue to underscore the importance of voting and the need for federal legislation to counteract recent bills in many statehouses that have sought to restrict or limit the right to vote. At the most recent meeting, Executive Council reaffirmed the Church's commitment to voting rights for all those eligible.”



You can help by contacting your representatives in Washington to urge passage of the John Lewis Voting Rights Advancement Act, which would prevent voting practices that are likely to be discriminatory before they cause harm:



## Inreach

What exactly is inreach?
